

MINUTES OF MAY 2015 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

May 9th 2015 - 9:30 a.m. - K.C. Irving Centre - Auditorium

Call to Order

Doug Jackson called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. upon confirmation of a quorum for the Annual General Meeting.

Adoption of Agenda

The adoption of the Agenda was approved by Charles Coll and seconded by Matt Gray.

Approval of Minutes

The Minutes of the May 10, 2014 Annual General Meeting were on motion from Geoff Irvine, seconded by Donalda MacBeath, approved unanimously.

President Ray Ivany's Comments

Doug Jackson invited President Ivany to say a few words. President Ivany began his remarks by noting how much the University values its relationship with the Associated Alumni of Acadia University and acknowledging that the Administration, Staff and Faculty are trying their utmost to look after this institution that has such a special meaning to its Alumni. He acknowledged that it has been a difficult yet important year for the University as we needed to get through a couple of big pieces of the puzzle to put the institution back on solid ground and make it sustainable for another 175 years. The University has been making progress; using enrollment as a benchmark where we saw a 30% fall, we have seen a steady increase in our enrollment year over year which is up by 27%; better than many institutions in the Province. We are now at 3500 undergraduate students which is where we want to be and we are good at delivering a quality undergraduate program. This year, we had two big issues that needed to be resolved; a collective agreement with our Faculty without a work stoppage was the first. A common question from incoming students and parents was "where are you in the process?" Disruption in the school year was a concern as we did not want to see a repeat of what happened in the past. We wish we could have finished sooner and without the public airing; but, we got there in the end with a new three year arrangement, its good. Bruce Phinney carried the Pension Committee issue to a successful conclusion. We had a pension plan which accounted for 20% of the salary costs which was significantly under water. It required a lot of creativity and we owe a debt of gratitude to Bruce Phinney. Thankfully we arrived at a solution which will see

the University Pension Plan migrate to the Public Service Superannuation Plan and the University is now out of the Pension Plan business. It gives our Faculty and Staff certainty and security and received a vote of 89% in favour of the transfer.

President Ivany noted that without the fundamental building blocks in place, you can run into problems. We have the foundation.

We also need the provincial government to do their part. We need a fair and equitable allocation of provincial funding in the manner in which it is distributed among the institutions. In 2008, the Province changed the funding formula and Acadia lost \$7 million/annum while three institutions saw a double digit increase in their share of the available funds. It led to complete disarray and raised significant issues. The institutions benefiting from the rejigged funding formula took that money and used it to enhance their scholarship offerings causing disparity. This drove students away from Acadia as other schools were able to offer twice what they had in the past in what had been a relatively level playing field and we have never really recovered. Acadia lit its own fire by taking on a significant debt level but we are asking the provincial government to take the gasoline they threw on the fire away and sort this out with a more fair and equitable distribution of provincial funds. We will see what the year brings.

Matt Rios asked President Ivany for his comments on Bill 100: Universities Accountability & Sustainability Act, really two Bills in one. President Ivany noted that the Province of Nova Scotia is in a very peculiar position in Canada when it comes to federal government transfers of education dollars which is based on the number of people in the Province not on the number of students coming to school in the Province. As a Province we have been very successful at attracting students from outside the Province and internationally. Acadia has students from every Province and Territory and from over 50 countries and the Province gets punished for every student who comes here. Nova Scotia pays the highest amount per capita towards education and receives the second lowest dollar allotment per student in federal funding transfers. Bill 100 is the end result. The Province has indicated that there will be limited 1%/annum increase in education funding grants over the next four years; a short term tuition reset for domestic, out of province and international students; Universities are going to be held accountable for their fiscal status; there will be no more bailouts and we are going to put legislation in place which will give Universities recourse to revitalization plans rather than receivership in certain circumstances. President Ivany noted that neither option is recommended from an institutional perspective, and, under the Bill, you could easily trip into the process which would have a marked impact on attracting students and donors. The Government is drawing a line in the sand.

In response to a question from the floor on bringing more students to the University President Ivany said the short answer is yes we could increase the enrollment to 3800 +/- students without materially impacting the quality of the program we deliver and we would like to get our International students to 15%, currently sitting at 11-12%, but at 4000, it becomes a challenge as you begin to lose that magical sense of community that we have at Acadia. Many institutions have lost their way spiritually and academically by growing large. There is a scale issue, some growth is good but not too much. When we had the drop in enrollment, the campus felt lacking in energy but we have that back. We have to test growth in stages.

2014-2015 Annual Report

Doug Jackson directed the Members present to the AAAU 2014-2015 Annual Report in the materials distributed at the meeting. It has been an amazing year for the Association, wrapping up the 175th Anniversary celebration with fireworks in December. If you look at the list of events in the Executive Director of Alumni Affair's Report we have supported the Alumni Office with many of these events. We helped, and will continue to help, the Alumni Office in these endeavours. Doug thanked the great Board of Directors he works with and noted key Board accomplishments including the signing of two new affinity relationships with Industrial Alliance and BMO MasterCard; developments in Governance, including the adoption of two new By-Laws and a Conflict of Interest Policy; establishment of the new Outstanding Young Alumni Award and the retooled Faculty Awards; and completion of a Disbursement Request Policy. Doug also thanked Ian Murray for his support and his small but mighty Alumni Affairs team which supports the AAAU daily and delivers on great programming for our Alumni. Doug also thanked the leadership of the University for its guidance through the many highs and lows of the past year and the departing Board members for their contributions while serving on the Board: Jake Rideout, Stan Thomas, Al MacDonald, Leslie Flemming and Jocelynn Graham. Doug asked our Alumni to please have a conversation with us if you have concerns.

Executive Director's Report

Ian Murray, Executive Director of Alumni Affairs & Advancement Strategy, began his report by reflecting on the fact that this is his 5th Anniversary with the University holding the best job right behind Ray Ivany and notes how great it is to feel good about Acadia every day, reaching out to Alumni and helping them connect with each other and the University. He commends his small but mighty staff that helps the Office accomplish great things. He welcomed Libby Burnham, Chancellor, Rod Morrison and Nancy Handrigan ; Oonagh Proudfoot the Senior Alumni Officer an AAAU funded position which gave the Office the added manpower required to do get things done, Melanie Jackson, International events, Sandra Symonds, responsible for all things local and Fred Sgambati who keeps us going in the social media world. Ian commended the AAAU Board on the great strides that have been made from a governance perspective. There has been much hard work and the Association & Board have a clear path forward in terms of where they are going. Ian also noted the great work that is being accomplished with the Alumni Bulletin publication.

Turning to the circulated list of events that were carried out in the last year, Ian noted that it was a job very well done given the small school, office and budget to be able to host 45+ events following a preceding year of hosting some 75 events to celebrate the schools 175th anniversary, none of which would have been possible without the Association's fiscal support to help defray the costs incurred in reaching out to Alumni in communities across the country and in various international locations. Highlights included the Charlottetown reception; the Summer Reunion Dinner hosting 226 people; the Beaubassin reception in September which was a marvelous joint project event with the Irving Foundation; Cookie day which saw Chancellor Burnham all over campus handing out 'A' decorated cookies and the Ron James Homecoming concert. We held an event in Beijing for the first time, hosted Xmas on the Hill in Ottawa and a Florida gathering in March. We had a terrific Gala event in April, exceeding all previous ticket sales, with Geoff Irvine, Hugh Bray and their sales team really knocking it out of the park.

We received some amazing gifts this year from donors including the Scotia Bank \$175,000 gift to fund five scholarships renewable over four years in honor of the school's 175th Anniversary; the Stevens Family very generous donation of \$1Million for the high performance training center; the McCain family donation to refurbish the now Andrew H. McCain Arena and the Wu family \$1.5 Million donation to create the Wu Welcome Centre on the Alumni Hall site creating new meeting and office space which will be open for use by mid to late summer. In closing, Ian noted that Summer Reunions are around the corner for the classes of 40, 45, 50, 55, 60, 74 & 75. Registrations are coming in now and will be completed 100% online.

Financial Report

Matt Gray presented the Association's Treasurer's Report for the 2014-2015 year and the Financial Statements. In reviewing the financial position of the AAAU, Matt noted that we are in a transition phase with a focus on being strong financial stewards limiting our spending to operational dollars only. We have seen an increase in funds from \$937,000 to \$1M and the key take-away is that we are in a stronger financial position moving

forward. Matt thanked everyone on the Finance Committee for their hard work as well as the Alumni Office, the Treasurer and VP Finance for the University, Mary MacVicar and Manager Systems and Stewardship, Cassie Tremain. Kiersten Amos moved that the Financial Statements for the 2014-2015 year be approved, seconded by Hugh Bray. Motion carried unanimously.

New Business

Doug Jackson called for any new business. No new business was presented.

Presentation

Before moving to the Nominations Committee Report, Doug Jackson asked Leslie Flemming a retiring Director of the AAAU Board, to step forward to receive a small token of our appreciation for her contributions to the Board over the last several years in the form of a framed certificate. Doug Jackson noted that similar framed certificates would be provided to the other retiring members of the Board, Jake Rideout, Al MacDonald, Stan Thomas and Jocelyn Graham.

Nominations Report

Hugh Bray, Past President of the Association, began his Nominations Report by thanking Charles Coll and Bruce Phinney for their work in tandem with him on the Committee and introduced the new members of the Board: Ian MacIsaac, Lisa Peck, Barry Taylor, Jill Wagner and Nick Westcott whose biographies appear on pages 17 & 18 of the AAAU Annual Report. Hugh called for any further Nominations from the floor three times. Seeing and hearing no further Nominations Hugh declared Nominations closed. Tony Stewart moved that the nominations as outlined in page 16 be approved as presented:

From the Director of Alumni Affairs:

The Office of Alumni Affairs has completed another successful year, working in partnership with the Association and the University administration on behalf of our more than 27,000 active alumni around the world.

Over the past year, we have been deliberate in focusing our efforts and energy for maximum impact, and supported the work carried out through the various active committees of the AAAU. THE "BULLETIN" AND COMMUNICATIONS:

Two Alumni Bulletins, meeting with very favourable feedback from members, were delivered last year – one in the spring and one in the fall. To supplement the information and updates shared in the Bulletin, a monthly e-newsletter, chalk full of updates, invitations, and campus news was sent to all alumni for whom we have email addresses. In addition to the Bulletin and monthly e-newsletter, numerous "special bulletin" emails were sent to either the full alumni family, or to specific segments of the family sharing news or to promote an up-coming event or opportunity. All of these communication channels were underpinned by a more streamlined and contemporary set of web pages that were doggedly updated throughout the year. In recent years, we have become more active in communicating with our alumni through our Facebook pages, as well as through Twitter. Photos from events and initiatives are posted online in Flickr albums.

ALUMNI RECORDS:

Maintaining accurate alumni records is an important function of the Alumni Affairs Office as it enables us to communicate effectively with our alumni worldwide. We consider an individual to be an "active alum" if we have contact information for them. We encourage all Alumni to update their current contact information as we regularly use email, mail and the alumni "Bulletin" to inform our alumni about special events, reunions and branch activities. We will often get mail returned to us because an alumna/alumnus has moved and has not forwarded a new address. If you know of someone who is not hearing from us and would like to, please encourage them to get in touch with the Alumni Office. Our extensive information management system allows us to manage each relationship with an alumna/alumnus as they would like. We are able to not receive email correspondence if they do not want to; to not be solicited if they do not want to, etc. Currently we sit at 39, 749 living alumni as of March 2016 (these numbers include those for whom we do not have contact information)

AAAU TREASURER'S REPORT: 2015-2016

I would like to thank the University Treasurer and Associate Vice President, Finance, Mary MacVicar; Senior Alumni Officer, Oonagh Proudfoot; Executive Director of Alumni Affairs and Advancement Strategy, Ian Murray; and Manager of Systems and Stewardship, Cassandra Tremain for their support in helping to facilitate the ongoing administration of the AAAU budget and finances.

Over the course of the last year, the AAAU continued to support a number of Alumni events, the University community and current Acadia students while ensuring that the financial stability of the AAAU is maintained for years to come. We continued to exercise discipline on ensuring total disbursements align to the "operating revenue" of the AAAU. As a result of this focus for the second consecutive year AAAU total assets grew and as of March 31, 2016 were \$1,124,849.

The AAAU generated a positive disbursement position of \$96,842 for the financial year ended March 31, 2016. This was caused by continued success from our Affinity partnerships, which continue to be expanded, and is a strong source of revenue for the AAAU.

As I transition off the AAAU Board of Directors, I would like to thank Doug Jackson and Hugh Bray for their support during my time on the Board. It has been a pleasure giving back to Acadia and I look forward to remaining active in the alumni community for years to come.
