Course Overview

This course is intended to introduce you to the scientific examination of behaviour and mental processes. In addition to an introduction to the history and research methods of psychology, specific content areas include biological bases of behaviour, sensation and perception, consciousness, learning, thinking, language, and memory. There are no pre-requisites for this course.

The course is structured to provide assignments that encourage you to apply and/or interpret the concepts that you are learning from the textbook and online study guides to your own context. The textbook is a very popular introductory psychology book in North America, has significant Canadian content, and is written in an engaging readable manner. Chapter readings, assignments, and tests form the basis of the course structure.

Assignments

Assignments encourage you to apply the concepts you are reading about. It is best to complete each assignment after you have read the corresponding chapter.

You will see that self-reflection is a component of some assignments – you will not be graded on your openness to self reflection, but rather, the way you think through the assignment. The assignments should be able to be answered in one or two pages (approximately 500 words).

Assignment Submission

The assignments should be submitted on Acorn. Do not send them as e-mail attachments.

Tests

There are 4 timed online tests. Each of these tests consists of 25 multiple-choice questions Test 1 covers chapters 1 & 2, Test 2 covers chapters 3 & 4, Test 3 covers chapters 5 & 6 and Test 4 covers chapters 7 & 8. You will have 30 minutes only to complete these tests, so ensure that you are ready to do the tests and that you will not be interrupted so that you can make the most of your 30 minutes of test-taking.

Final Exam

The final exam consists of 100 multiple-choice questions designed to assess your comprehension of the material covered in all 8 chapters of the textbook, with approximately 12 questions per chapter. **The exam is closed book** and the textbook is not allowed. You will have 3 hours to complete the exam.
